

Other Subject Areas

Our **history** work this term will focus on learning about Stone Age Britain.

During our **geography** lessons, we will be learning about volcanoes and earthquakes.

During our **PE** lessons we will be learning to play cricket and football.

In **computing** we will be looking at online safety, coding and using graphs.

In **science** we will be learning about forces and magnets moving onto light in the second half term.

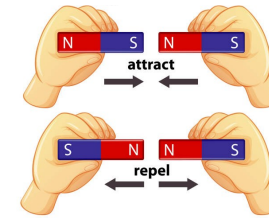
Fluency Homework will be written in fluency books every day and will need to be completed before the start of the next school day. This should take around 5 minutes to complete per evening.

	<h2 style="text-align: center;">What are we learning?</h2>	<h2 style="text-align: center;">Things I could do at home to support my child's learning</h2>
English	<p>To start the term we will be looking at the picture book <i>The Day the Crayons Quit</i>. During this unit, we will be learning how to write persuasive letters.</p> <p>In the second part of this half-term, we will be looking at stories based on familiar fairytales but with a twist! Our key text will be <i>The True Story of the Three Little Pigs</i> by Jon Scieszka. We will be building up to writing our own stories based on fairy tales.</p> <p>After half-term, we will be studying the picture book <i>Meerkat Mail</i> by Emily Gravett. As part of this unit we will be writing non-chronological reports about animals.</p> <p>To end the Autumn Term, we will be writing poetry about the winter season. We will be reading and sharing some model poetry then planning and writing our own to perform to each other.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Read often with your child including reading and discussing a variety of texts to encourage a love of reading. Please encourage children to write meaningful, relevant comments about what they have read in their reading logs. • Read traditional tales with your child and encourage them to link these to the texts we have been reading in class. Ask them to retell these stories to you and discuss the similarities and differences together. • Help your child to 'read between the lines' when reading e.g. being able to answer questions like; how do we know this person feels this way? How do we know this character's age? Etc. • Look at sets of instructions together. This could be to set up and play a board game, do some cooking or even build a lego model. Try following the instructions together. When you've finished, evaluate them. Were these instructions easy to follow? How could they be clearer? Which features has the writer used to make their instructions?
Maths	<p>We will start the year by looking at the place value of numbers up to and including 1,000. We will show understanding of the value of these numbers by representing, ordering, comparing them.</p> <p>Next, we will look at addition and subtraction. This will include learning to use the column method to add and subtract 3-digit numbers. We will be focusing on reinforcing and strengthening our understanding of making exchanges across columns based on our knowledge of place value.</p> <p>Following this, we will start to look at multiplication and division. We will be looking at multiplication as equal groups and arrays and strengthening our understanding of the 2 and 5 times-tables.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Notice and discuss the numbers all around us in everyday life e.g. the total cost of a shopping trip, distances shown on road signs or even the total number of people attending a football game. Ask your child to explain the place value of these numbers. Ask them questions which require them to add, subtract, multiply and divide mentally. • Please continue to help your child to learn their 2, 5, 10 and 4 times tables by chanting, singing or using a variety of websites including Times Table Rockstars! Encourage them to practise the corresponding division facts too. • Challenge your child to teach you a written method they've learnt in school such as column addition or subtraction. This is a great way to secure the children's understanding of a method. • Encourage your child to tell the time on both digital and analogue clocks throughout the day and ask them questions about this such as what time will it be in 5 minutes, half an hour etc.
RE	<p>Year 3 will begin the year by thinking about how we all belong together as part of God's family and about the Sacrament of Reconciliation.</p> <p>In the second half-term, we will be learning more about prayer and preparing for The Coming of The Lord during Advent.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provide your child with a space in the home for private prayer and reflection. This may be in their bedroom or another quiet and private space. • Ask your child about what they have been learning about in school. Ask them to tell you any prayers they have learnt and discuss the meaning of these. Encourage your child to make up their own prayers too! • Attend Sunday mass services whenever possible and talk about the readings with your child. • During Advent, set time aside to remember the 'reason for the season' and prepare to celebrate Jesus' birth at Christmas.
